One of the ways funeral services can start is with the declaration, “Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the source of all mercy and the God of all consolation, who comforts us in all our sorrows so that we can comfort others in their sorrows with the consolation we ourselves have received from God” (ELW p. 279).

This month, last year, was one of the most challenging months of my ministry. The challenges started on Sunday, August 5th, 2018, when Ron Borchardt did not show up for worship. He was normally at Zion and playing the organ before I showed up to start getting ready for worship, but that Sunday, the organ bench was empty and the pipes were silent. I hoped that he had just had a long night and overslept. I never expected my worst fears to be true. It ended on Tuesday, August 28th, when Laura Stellhorn was laid to rest in Oakland Cemetery with verse 7 of *I Know That My Redeemer Lives!* (ELW #619):

He lives and grants me daily breath;
he lives, and I shall conquer death;
he lives my mansion to prepare;
he lives to bring me safely there.



We had a lot of funerals last year, and for a lot of significant people in the life of our congregation, but August in particular—with Ron’s unexpected death and Laura’s well-earned rest from her labors—was challenging. I was looking for the consolation from God in my sorrow that would help me comfort others in their sorrow with that same consolation from God. There were times when it was hard to see.

One challenging part of grief is that all grief is the same grief. My broken heart for Laura and desire to fulfill her wishes for her funeral, and my tears and anguish over Ron were the same grief. It was also the same grief I had for Annabell and Stone, Steve and Carl, George and Susan, and all those who I have the honor of laying peacefully to rest. It is the same grief I have for our daughter, Lucy, my step-father, Mitch, my grandparents and step-grandparents, my great-grandmother, and too many of my friends and mentors.

I know this month will be challenging because this month last year was challenging, and every time grief stirs within me, it is the same grief—and I know it is the same with you. Whether it is grief for Ron and Laura or your own family and friends, remember that this grief is why Jesus came. His crucifixion, death, resurrection, and ascension have changed everything.

It is the same grief, you see. The grief that God the Father has at the death of God the Son is the same grief we have for those we love who have died. This is the consolation we have from God. “When we were baptized in Christ Jesus, we were baptized into his death. We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live a new life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall be united with him in a resurrection like his” (ELW, p. 280).

The grief we bear is the same grief God the Father bears at Jesus’ death because all those who have died in Jesus have died with Jesus. God’s consolation in our sorrows is the resurrection of Jesus, which is the resurrection of all those for whom we grieve. When we grieve together, we grieve with God, who promises us that death is not the end.

The Sandusky Excursion



The Toledo Central City Teenagers art show “Here. I Am.” will be at Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, 503 Columbus Ave, Sandusky, OH 44870, on Saturday, August 3rd from 4 – 8 p.m.

“Hear. I Am.” is a grassroots, entrepreneurial art experience from Toledo Central City Teenagers.

The idea was brain child of Yusuf Lateef, a premiere artist of Toledo, OH, his colleague, Ben Cohen of Radiant City Arts, and Pr. Mike Hanck from Salem Lutheran Church. In the struggle to provide artistic programming for Central City Teens which dignified and honored them as artists, this humble movement was thus born, with the teenagers growing into the project and making it their own.

“Hear. I Am.” has found support from The YMCA, Harbor, and the congregations of The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

There will be t-shirts available to purchase for \$20 bearing the “Here. I Am.” logo. All t-shirt sales are split evenly between the costs of the program and a common pool for youth stipends, also evenly split.

Artwork will also be available to purchase. All sales of individual paintings and other pieces of art are placed in a stipend for the actual teenage artist who created it. All of Yusuf’s own sales pay for his costs and involvement in the program. This way the teenagers gain the experience of being acknowledged artists and learn how to use a craft to generate income. They are also encouraged to cultivate their talents and skills.

Everyone is encouraged to join us and be a part of the movement, “Hear. I Am.”

We will still have our regular Saturday 6:00 p.m. worship, and Pastor Mike and some of the youth will be with us for that worship.

The art show will also run from 7:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 4th, for members of Zion who can’t make the Saturday times. Pastor Mike and some of the youth will also be present for our Sunday services.

Fall into Lakeside is a 2 night/ 3 day event for middle and high school students that will take place at the beautiful Lakeside Chautauqua on the shores of Lake Erie.



Over the weekend we will focus on the verse Hebrews 13:8. We all know today's youth face challenges and game changing circumstances they often have no control over. We want them to know that Jesus is there for them. He is the same yesterday, today and FOREVER! There are also many great activities planned for the weekend including guest speakers, Band Attaboy, Bible studies, service projects, college reps, and other exciting surprises!

All Zion youth attending Fall Into Lakeside will have their fees reimbursed.

Parents: *At Fall into Lakeside you can rest knowing your child is in good hands. We focus on biblical living and our staff create a friendly atmosphere for fellowship.*

How Hospitable Are We?


Dear Friends in Christ,

The result is our exposed soldiers have been poisoned and are dying of lung illnesses and cancers that are baffling researchers and doctors. Susan is directly involved as her son-in-law is one of the 11,000 Vet applicants seeking medical assistance from the VA and being denied care. Jesus cried out, “Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, ‘Out of the believer’s heart shall flow rivers of living water.’”

– John 7:37-38

If you travel to the Grand Canyon and hike along the rim in the desert you will find an interesting sign. It reads, **“Stop! Drink water. You are thirsty, whether you realize it or not.”** It is a baffling idea to think that we may not recognize our own thirst. But we human beings know that it is very possible to be so preoccupied living, working, checking off our to-do-list, that we forget to nourish our bodies. More than once I have come home from a busy day to suddenly discover, “I am thirsty”. I am not alone, 75% of Americans don’t get enough water to drink each day. Three out of four of us walk around in a chronic state of dehydration and we don’t even realize it.

The same can happen in our faith lives. A sign could be posted for us in the dry places cautioning, **“Stop! Drink water. You are thirsty, whether you realize it or not.”** Sometimes I think the Holy Spirit suddenly makes us aware of our thirst for a reason. Realizing your thirst is a gift. It allows you to seek a source of abundant nourishment.

Four years ago we began Diakonia (pronounced dee-ak-on-ee'-ah) in the Southeastern Conference of our synod. We noticed that there were lay leaders in our congregations thirsty for deeper understanding, so we gathered teachers and learners together and brought the Diakonia Program here to Northwestern Ohio. **This year, Diakonia is expanding, including a new class in the North Central and Eastern Conferences.** Diakonia is a call to discipleship. It gathers Christians together to grow and learn in order to more fully respond to the call to serve Christ. The curriculum consists of twelve courses, with six courses offered each academic year. Each course has five sessions that meets in three-hour increments on Tuesday nights. Each course is taught by a different local rostered minister and students come from many different congregations. Weekly reading assignments and reflections are designed to relate to the topic of study and stir conversation. Tuition is \$60 per course. Scholarships are also available for all those in need of assistance.

“Stop! Drink water. You are thirsty, whether you realize it or not.” If you are thirsty for deeper spiritual growth, maybe it is time to explore Diakonia. Diakonia is an invitation to gather with other Christians and grow together in our call to be disciples of Christ. Please pray about whether God is calling you or someone you know to this program.
