

As schools ramp up again, having been underway in the area—some for several weeks—and as we bless the backpacks on Rally Day, I think of the role of Lutheranism in education. While not originally part of the Sunday School Movement, Lutherans have long embraced education—and especially higher education—as a way of equipping God's people to make the most of the gifts God has given them for the sake of the Gospel.

One of the two things Lutherans brought to the United States was a desire to build schools. (The other, by the way, was a desire to build hospitals.) With all the educators at Zion, both active and retired, I hope it doesn't come as a surprise that Lutherans place high value in education. Remember the history of Zion and those days long ago when Zion had a school and the tradition of pastors here being overeducated. (For which I am thankful!) But Luther reminds us that even education has its limitations.

Luther lived in a time of transition as an era grounded in spirituality and mysticism came into

conflict with the rising ideals of the scientific method and what would give birth to the Enlightenment. Luther saw that education had its limits because even all the knowledge in the world cannot justify us before God. Neither, as Luther well knew, can any feeling or emotion.

In our day where we are discovering the limits of scientific inquiry and the shortcomings of the Enlightenment as they come in conflict with spirituality and mysticism, it is worth remembering what Luther learned—neither reason nor emotion can save us. This does not free us from learning or from our relationship with Jesus, but does help us focus on why we learn and pray and read the Bible and come to worship.

As one in Zion's line of overeducated pastors, here's what I've discovered: we don't have to have all the answers. It's okay for Christians to not know. It's okay for us to admit that faith does not provide all the answers—and in some cases may cause more questions. It's okay for us to ask questions, especially if those questions lead us deeper into the Bible or to wondering about our neighbors in need.

I hope this isn't news either, but as we turn

back into the annual cycle of academic timing, saying, "I don't know," is not a failing. Indeed, those who have been career scientists will tell you that the unknown is the most exciting. Those areas where we don't know why things happen they way they do, that's where we can find energy for both scientific and spiritual wonder. God's creation is so majestic and awesome that we will never be able to understand it all—and that is itself majestic and awesome!

So teachers, teach to the glory of God! Students, learn to the glory of God! Parents, lead in learning for the glory of God! Grandparents, aunts, and uncles, support and praise for the glory of God! Neighbors, encourage for the glory of God! And in all things,

give thanks for God's gifts of learning and teaching, science and spirituality, athletic prowess and artistic expression. These are all from God's gifts of reason and faith and can all be used so that we and all those around us, "sing to the Lord a new song!"

July had some interesting events that directly affected these numbers—which is why numbers can't tell you everything. The second Sunday in July had both a visiting youth group that almost doubled our normal attendance at the 8:00 a.m. service, and the 10:30 service that same Sunday was when we celebrated Deacon Carolyn's 20th Anniversary of rostering. The last Saturday in July was when the power outage resulted in damage to our air conditioning system. As a result, the last Saturday service in July was canceled and the two Sunday services were held at and in conjunction with First Congregational.

Given all this, it is remarkable that we're only \$2,500 behind our offering and gifts estimation for the year, and only \$1,300 of that is from this month of oddness. To give some perspective: at the end of July last year, we were almost \$9,000 behind our offering and gifts estimation.

Carolyn's Corner . . .

At the recent Global Leadership Summit, speaker Craig Groeschel who is the founder and senior pastor of Life. Church an online church meeting stated that, "You are a leader. You have influence." I know that some of you will argue that point; that you aren't comfortable being up front, leading a meeting or directing others. But think of other ways you lead. What do you do in your daily activities? Do you organize a home? Plan meals? Have a spouse or children? Do you have grandchildren or a neighbor you assist? Do you work outside the home? Do you belong to organizations or social clubs or volunteer in the community? These are just a few examples of what it means to be a leader – not necessarily being the up-front person, but making a difference. Often you might not even realize the influence you have on others.

Craig suggests that one way we influence others is through the heart. We live in a world where knowledge is important, but when we want to connect with someone on a more personal level, the heart (emotions) becomes the catalyst for change and growth. And, the way we often do this is by sharing our stories. What is your story? Are you able to share it in casual conversation? Think about what you might tell someone about yourself. These are the things we usually ask you to share when we gather in small groups. They may seem like small talk and chatter to you, but they identify who you are, not only to others, but they help us to get to know ourselves better.

As we begin fall schedules, think about how and where you might be a blessing to the family of Zion and the Sandusky community. While we need Sunday School teachers and council members, there are other ministries that might better fit your gifts. We need folks to serve at places like Care and Share, Osborne School, and Nehemiah Center. We need ushers, lectors and crucifers. We need folks who can help us care for the building. And we need folks who can pray. Where do you fit in? I know you do and I know that makes you a leader!


